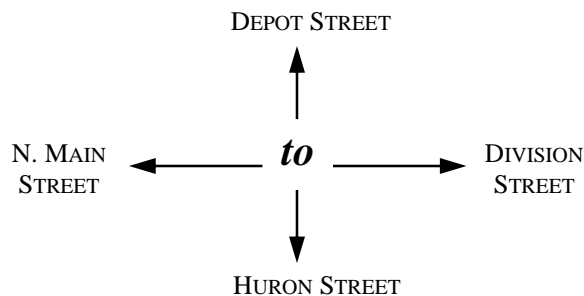

To preserve, enhance, and promote the social, cultural, historical, educational, residential, and commercial life of the Kerrytown community

A District Rich in History

1800's An industrial region - complete with a coal gasification plant, slaughterhouse, meat packing plant, junkyard, brickyard, foundries, lumberyards, stone works, livery stables, and train station. Residences developed for laborers working in the area.

1900's The center of the African American community as a residential district and energetic hub for black-owned businesses. Reverend Carpenter saves the Kerrytown area from demolition. 342 structures are saved, including the homes of 502 families and the buildings which now house Zingerman's, Kerrytown Shops, The Tree, Farmer's Market, Treasure Mart, Argiero's Restaurant, and entire block of brick buildings on Ann St., from Main to Fourth Avenue.

2000's Kerrytown District—now a unique blend of residents and businesses that combine historic charm and new innovations. A neighborhood of diverse individuals, one-of-a-kind restaurants, independent retailers, arts and artists, services and schools. We promote a sense of community with towering trees, brick streets, and the feel of a small village.
